His music has been marked by an aggressive style of rapping, while his controversial public personality is characterized by his characteristic rainbow-colored hair, extensive tattoos, public feuds with other celebrities and legal issues. [5] The 6ix9ine became widely known in late 2017 after the release of her debut single, Gummo, which was a sleeper hit. He later released the mixtape Day69 (2018), which was supported by the singles Kooda, Keke and Gotti , all of which were charted on the Billboard Hot 100. Despite the negative criticism, Dummy Boy was certified platinum by the Recording Industry Association of America (RIAA). [6] In 2015, 6ix9ine pleaded guilty to a felony of using a child in a sexual performance and received a four-year probation period and a 1,000-hour community service order. In 2018 he was arrested on charges of racketeering, weapons and drugs. He pleaded guilty to nine charges, including conspiracy to commit murder and armed robbery in February 2019, and was granted early release during the COVID-19 pandemic following concerns about his vulnerability to the disease due to his asthma condition. He was placed under house arrest for the rest of his term. After her release from prison, her single Gooba debuted and reached number three in the United States and Trollz, her third collaboration with Minaj, debuted at number one in the country. His second album, TattleTales (2020), debuted at number four on the Billboard 200. Daniel Hernandez was born on May 8, 1996, in Bushwick, Brooklyn, New York City to a mother from Atlixco, Mexico and father is also named Daniel Hernandez. His mother, Natividad Perez-Hernandez, came to the United States in 1988 to seek a better life and opportunity; she was a worker and a cleaner. She is also diabetic and has had surgery on four hernias. Hernandez has played baseball and football team at the age of 13, but his mother refused because he didn't trust a stranger who took her at a young age. Hernandez has an older brother, Oscar Osiris Hernandez (born August 25, 1994). [11] Hernandez has his name tattooed on the right side of his head. Rather than continuing his training, he began working in various jobs such as being a delivery man and delivery man in a grocery store to help his mother financially. Over the next three years, he released multiple tracks and videos with titles such as Scumlife, Yokai and Hellsing Station, attracting for its aggressive rap style and the use of anime as musical visual videos. Many of his early songs were released by FCK THEM, a Slovak-based music label. The mixtape was released on February 23, 2018 and debuted at number 4 on the Billboard 200 album chart with 55,000 units equivalent to the album, of which 20,000 were pure sales. [31] According to Jon Caramanica of the New York Times, the tape was a consequence of the soundcloud rap explosion and was notable for its willingness to deviate from the prevailing sound of hip hop. After the release of Day69, two songs from the album, Billy and Rondo, both debuted on the Billboard Hot 100, with Billy peaking at number 50 and Rondo at number 73. [34] In April 2018, Hernandez released Gotti, a remix of a film he made for the artist Packman entitled Got it, Got it. Hernandez sparked controversy in May 2018 when he was involved in a shootout with fellow New York rapper Casanova's entourage as part of a feud; this led Hernandez to lose a contract \$5 million for headphones and to be banned from the Barclays Center. After filming, Hernandez stopped releasing music for several months, before releasing Tati, with DJ Spinking in June, which debuted at number 43 on the Billboard Hot 100 [39] [39] during a performance in Amsterdam in June 2018 In July 2018, Hernandez released his eighth single, Fefe, with Nicki Minaj and Murda Beatz; The single debuted at number four on the Billboard Hot 100 before reaching number three in its second week, marking Hernandez's highest chart entry and his first single to reach the top five of the Hot 100. Fefe was later certified double platinum by the Recording Industry Association of America. His later singles, Bebe and Stoopid also reached the top 30 of the Hot 100. In September 2018, Hernandez signed a release contract with Los Angeles-based music company Create Music Group. In early October 2018, Hernandez was included in the song Aulos Reloaded with house DJ French Vladimir Cauchemar and Kick with Danish singer Jimilian. On November 23, but on November 21 it was announced that the album would be postponed. The album was finally released without notice on November 27, on all streaming services. Despite generally negative critical acclaim, the album became its highest on the Billboard 200 behind Travis Scott's Astroworld. [50] In April 2020, Hernandez had to ask permission from a judge to film a video in his backyard while in solitary confinement at home and was later granted permission. On May 7, 2020, Hernandez announced that he would release a new single on May 8, 2020, marking his return to music and his 24th birthday. The song, titled Gooba, was released along with a music video. According to Pitchfork's Madison Bloom, the track includes references to COVID-19 (They're sick, they were hot, long before the coronavirus) and Hernandez's collaboration with federal prosecutors and testimony (Tell me how I shook, I came home in a big bag). Hernandez announced after several delays his upcoming single Trollz, a collaboration with Nicki Minaj, which was released on June 12, 2020. The song debuted at the top of the Hot 100, marking 6ix9ine's first number one in chart history, however the record was broken again later that year by Taylor Swift with Willow. A third single, Yava, was released from the charts the following week. A fourth single, Punani, released on August 2, The songs are all included on his second studio album, TattleTales, which was released on September 4, 2020. After the album's release Hernandez complained about the treatment he received from music platforms Spotify and Apple Music with them who did not show that they had released a new album on the main pages of their store fronts and that they did not include it in their playlists that are very influential in the charts, with him explaining that he sees it as the music industry that uses the influence of these platforms to harm him because of his collaboration. [60] In November 2020, Hernandez was profiled in a real Hulu documentary film, 69: The Saga of Danny Hernandez. While there are archival footage of Hernandez, he was not interviewed for the film. Before exploding, for a year and a half - 400 and something during the day - I literally prayed every day while walking with my dog Tito. I prayed every day: God, please change my life ... God, please change my life; I'm a good guy. Please change my life, and then Gummo came and life changed. And then I was like damn it, God is real. I knew that if I prayed every day it would work, because God is real. And my life has changed. [80] On March 23, 2018, Hernandez conducted a radio interview at the Breakfast Club, along with Australian Pastor Brian Houston. In this interview, the pastor held hands with Hernandez and prayed for him; asking God to help Hernandez make wise decisions and bless his family. He claimed to have gained more than 200 pounds during his time in prison, but said the use of the drug had helped him lose 30 pounds since he was released. His attorney denies the overdose claim. [86] Legal issues Hernandez children's sexual performance allegations have been embroiled in an allegation of child sexual performance. He was charged with three counts of the crime after a February 2015 incident in which he had physical contact with a 13-year-old girl and later released videos of the incident online as part of a music video. Three videos are described in the criminal complaint against Hernandez. In the first, the child engages in oral sex with the separately accused defendant Taguan Anderson, while the defendant, Daniel Hernandez, stands behind the child making a pushed movement with her pelvis and slapping her on the buttocks. The child is naked in the video. Other videos show the child sitting on Hernandez's laps. In a November 2017 interview, Hernandez said he had no sexual contact with the girl and denied knowing she was underage. Hernandez also claimed to be 17 at the time of the incident, although the date of birth listed in the complaint against him and in his statement to police shows that he was 18 years old. Based on his plea deal, Hernandez must obtain his GED, refrain from posting sexually explicit or violent images of women or children on social media, and not commit another crime for two years, among other injunctions. If satisfied, the plea agreement will give Hernandez three years of probation and he will not have to register as a sexual harasser; if not, Hernandez could face up to three years in prison. At a January 2018 hearing, it was revealed that Hernandez had failed his GED test, but his sentence was postponed until April 10, 2018. Because of his ongoing legal troubles in light of his plea deal, the Manhattan district attorney's office announced that Hernandez could face up to years in prison and a possible registration of sex offenders for his 2015 case, [93] but was instead sentenced to four years probation starting in October 2018, with a clause that cannot utter the phrase Treyway in public as it was deemed to promote the gang's activity, as well as 1,000 hours of community service. The mall choke incident On July 12, 2018, Hernandez was arrested in New York for a pending warrant related to an incident in which he allegedly choked a 16-year-old man at galleria mall in Houston, Texas, in January 2018. All charges were eventually dropped after the teenager decided not to take legal action. [97] Robbery, assault and kidnapping incident In the early morning hours of July 22, 2018, Hernandez was kidnapped, beaten, and robbed by three armed assailants in Brooklyn. He had finished shooting fefe's music video (with Nicki Minaj and Murda Beatz) when the assailants grabbed him outside his home and whipped him with a gun. The robbers eventually took more than \$750,000 in custom jewelry and about \$35,000 in cash. Hernandez fled their vehicle and summoned police help through a stranger. He was taken to a hospital. In February 2019, Anthony Harv Ellison, a member of the Nine Trey Gangsters, was indicted for the July kidnapping and assault. On October 3, Ellison was found quilty. [100] Chief Keef shoots on June 2, 2018, Chief Keef was fired outside the W Hotel in New York City but not hit; no injuries were caused by the accident. Due to the ongoing feud, Hernandez was confirmed to be under investigation by the New York Police Department for possible involvement in the incident, despite being in Los Angeles at the time. [102] [103] In February 2019, Hernandez pleaded guilty to ordering the shooting of Chief Keef. Hernandez offered his associate Kintea Kooda B McKenzie \$20,000 to shoot Chief Keef. Domestic violence and alleged sexual assault On September 10, 2019, Hernandez admitted years of domestic violence in a cooperation agreement. Part of Hernandez's cooperation agreement with the government, which had not previously been made public, listed a number of crimes he had committed and for which the government agreed not to prosecute him. On the list, Judge Paul Engelmayer explained, Hernandez admitted domestic violence from 2011 to November 2018. Domestic violence charges against Hernandez first came to light in early 2019, including a detailed Daily Beast article[107] that featured testimony from the rapper's ex-girlfriend (and his daughter's mother), Sara Molina, who beat her for a seven-year period - a timeline that matches Hernandez's admission, though no names of victims were mentioned in court. Molina told the Daily Beast of numerous incidents of abuse, including a beating in Dubai that left her face so swollen that I could barely open my eves. Molina also told the Daily Beast that Hernandez bragged about being an addict. Meanwhile, Molina said Hernandez bragged about being an addict. manager who would recruit recruit to become a member of the violent Nine Trey Gangsta Bloods street gang. When Molina denied cheating on him, he says he punched her out of nowhere, driving an extension of her hair into her scalp. I was losing blood, he said. There was blood on the hotel's pillowcases. He was frightened. Molina told the Daily Beast that she did not report the assaults to police, although she provided the news agency with photos she said were taken shortly after the attacks, showing bruises and cuts. He went on to detail that Hernandez continued to beat me for two hours in a row, saying he punched me so hard in the right ear that I thought I was deaf. Molina describes that Hernandez punched, kicked and choked her, leaving her with two black eyes and multiple bruises. Then he went on to point out that he sexually assaulted her the next morning: He woke up, forced me to have sex with him, he said. I cried. Molina described another incident in April 2017, in which 6ix9ine beat her in a car in front of her daughter, then a one-year-old girl, who started screaming and crying. Molina claims that after guestioning Hernandez about a stripper he had dated, he dragged Me by the hair and slapped me in the face, which led to a black eye. Hernandez admitted physically abusing his ex-girlfriend again in an interview with The New York Times in 2020. On November 16, 2018, Hernandez made his second appearance on the radio show The Breakfast Club, in which he stated in particular: There is only one thing I fear in life. No, two things. I'm afraid of God, and I'm afraid the FBI. On November 18, 2018, Hernandez, his former fake manager Kifano Shotti Jordan and three other associates were arrested. Hernandez is charged with federal rico and firearms, including conspiracy to murder and armed robbery and faces life in prison. He is presumably part of a violent Bloods sect known as the Nine Gangster Treys. [114] Hernandez's attorney, Lance Lazzaro, supported bail for his client on the condition that Hernandez surrender his passport, pay just under \$2 million for bail, and placed under house arrest, but the judge denied bail, keeping Hernandez's legal team plans to appeal that decision. He was held at the Metropolitan Detention Center in Brooklyn under the general population before being transferred to another facility for security reasons, as Hernandez had multiple altercations with other prisoners, including those belonging to the crips street gang. time in prison, Hernandez asked to serve the rest of his prison sentence at home stating that he was at higher risk of contracting the COVID-19 virus due to his pre-existing asthma conditions. On April 1, 2020, Rolling Stone obtained a letter to the judge from U.S. Attorney Geoffrey Berman saying that the government does not oppose Hernandez's release at the beginning of childbirth. On Thursday, April 2, Hernandez's attorney, Dawn Florio, confirmed with XXL magazine that the court decided to allow the rapper to be released from prison and jailed. It was originally due to be released on August 2, 2020. His confinement at home ended on August 1, 2020. Feuds Trippie Redd In April 2017, Hernandez and Trippie Redd released their first collaboration, Poles1469 and in July 2017, they released another, Owee. Later that year, after seeing a post from a Twitter account stating that Hernandez's detractor ZillaKami, Trippie Redd denounced Hernandez, saying: Sorry brozay (sic), 1400 do not promote paedophiles ... On November 11, 2017, following a series of beards that the two exchanged on social media, Redd was attacked in the lobby of a New York hotel and blamed Hernandez and his crew in a live video on Instagram. You can't make false accusations, you can't spit on Live talking about New York. Fuck these blacks they're talking about, New York this, New York that, like, you just can't do that brother. You should put some ice on that chin, it's bruised. I feel sick, brother... I just want you to be my friend again, first proceed to sing the hook from Poles1469. He was referring to a trippie redd post that showed Hernandez holding hands with another man with a caption implying that Hernandez was a In February 2018, Hernandez was assaulted by several men outside a Los Angeles airport shortly after arguing with Trippie Redd on Instagram. Their feud continued to intensify with mutual trolling on the Internet. Hernandez later accused Trippie Redd on Instagram Live of having paedophile sex with fellow rapper Bhad Bhabie, who was a minor at the time. Trippie Redd has denied the allegations and reiterated Hernandez's conviction for using a child in sexual performance. Bhad Bhabie is also called on Instagram Live to deny the claims, but admitted that the two had kissed in the past, saving; 'We kissed but he wasn't that serious and he was 17 at the time. [133] However, this contradicts an account given by Trippie Redd to the late XXXTentacion about the nature of their relationship before it was publicly known. After trippie Redd's relationship with his then-girlfriend Alexandria Laveglia disbanded, [137] known professionally as Aylek\$, Hernandez began posting videos of himself with her, alluding to sexual activity between the two[138][139][140] After Hernandez's federal arrest in November 2018 on RICO charges, Trippie Redd mocked Hernandez's imprisonment in a video of him dancing to the tune of Akon's 2004 single Locked Up., imitating a prison scenario. [141] [142] Chief Keef Throughout 2018, Hernandez was embroiled in feuds with a number of Chicago drilling artists from the GloGang collective, including from domestic abuse and relationship issues related to fellow rapper Cuban Doll, who was in a relationship with Tadoe but also friendly with Hernandez. The two continued to argue on social media, Hernandez posted a video of his semi-romantic vacation in Hawaii with Cuban Doll on Instagram, [144] and driving to Cape Keef's old neighborhood and teasing him, [145] as well as contacting Aereon Clark, known professionally as Slim Danger, the mother of one of Chief Keef's sons, and registering to buy his designer clothes and verbally insult him and later receiving fellatio from her. [146] On May 8, 2018, Trippie Redd premiered the song I Kill People on Instagram, with Chief Keef and Tadoe, which had been targeted as a diss against Hernandez and Cuban Doll. [148] Other feuds Since his first release in April 2020, due to covid-19 concerns, 6ix9ine has been involved in a series of feuds, with among others, Meek Mill, 50 Cent, YG, Rich the Kid and Future in twitter tirade against 6ix9ine. In May 2020, 6ix9ine accused singers Ariana Grande and Justin Bieber of cheating and buying the way to reach the first voice of the Hot 100, after their song Stuck with U debuted at number three for the week ending May 23, 2020. He also accused Billboard of chart manipulation. [150] In a Post, 6ix9ine claimed grande and bieber were using six credit cards to buy 30,000 copies of their song at the last minute. [151] Both Grande and Bieber denied the allegations against them, as well as dispeling 6ix9ine's claims of using six credit cards, stating that their fans are the ones who purchased the songs and explaining that no more than four copies could be purchased. Known for his impact in the hip hop industry, he has been described as a master of the nuanced art of lyrical brevity. [4] Born in the southern Jamaican neighborhood of Queens, Jackson began selling drugs at the age of 12 during the crack epidemic of the 1980s. He later began pursuing a musical career and in 2000 produced Power of the Dollar for Columbia Records, but days before the planned release it was filmed and the album was never released. In 2002, after Jackson released the compilation Guess Who's Back?, he was discovered by Eminem and signed with Shady Records, under the aegis of Dr. Dre 's Aftermath Entertainment and Interscope Records. With the help of Eminem and Dr. Dre (who produced his first major album Get Rich or Die Tryin'), Jackson became one of the best-selling rappers in the world and became famous with east coast hip hop group G-Unit (which he leads de facto). In 2003, he founded G-Unit Records, signing his G-Unit partners Young Buck, Lloyd Banks and Tony Yayo. Jackson had similar commercial and critical success with his second album, The Massacre, which was released in 2005. He released his fifth studio album, Animal Ambition, in 2014, and since 2019, he has been working on his sixth studio album, Street King Immortal. He produces and stars in the show Power, which airs on Starz. Jackson has sold over 30 million albums worldwide and has won several awards, including a Grammy Award, thirteen Billboard Music Awards, six World Music Awards, three American Music Awards, and four BET Awards. He embarked on an acting career, appearing in the semi-autobiographical film Get Rich or Die (2005), in the Iraq War film Home of the Brave (2006) and Righteous Kill (2008). 50 Cent was ranked on the artist of the 2000s and third best rapper (behind Eminem and Nelly) of Billboard. Rolling Stone ranked Get Rich or Die Tryin' and In da Club on its lists of 100 best albums of the 2000s and 100 best songs of the 2000s at number 37 and 13 respectively. [9] Jackson was born in Queens, New York City, and raised in his southern Jamaican neighborhood by his mother Sabrina. A drug dealer, Sabrina raised Jackson until she died in a fire when Jackson was 8 years old. [11] After his mother's death and his father's departure. Jackson was raised by his grandmother. She started boxing at the age of about 11 and when she was 14, a neighbor opened a boxing gym for local vouth. When I didn't kill time at school, save in the gym or sell crack on the strip. Jackson recalled, [14] He sold crack during primary school, [15] I was competitive in the ring and hip-hop is also competitive... I think rappers condition themselves as boxers, so everyone feels like they're the champion. At the age of 12, Jackson began dealing narcotics when his grandparents thought he was on after-school programs[17] and brought guns and drug money to school. In tenth grade, he was captured by metal detectors at Andrew Jackson High School: I was embarrassed that I was arrested like that... After I was arrested like that... After I was arrested for selling four vials of cocaine to an undercover police officer. He was arrested again three weeks later when police searched his home and found heroin, ten ounces of crack cocaine and a starting gun. Although Jackson was sentenced to three or nine years in prison, he served six months in a training camp and earned his GED. He said he didn't use cocaine on his own. [13] Jackson adopted the nickname 50 Cent as a metaphor for change. The name was inspired by Kelvin Martin, an 80s Brooklyn robber known as 50 Cent; Jackson chose him because he says everything I want him to say. I'm the same kind of person 50 Cent was. You provide me for myself by any means. [22] Career 1996–2002: Rise to fame, shooting, and early mixtapes Jackson began rapping in a friend's basement, where he used turntables to record on instruments. In 1996, a friend introduced him to count lines, write choirs, structure songs, and make records, [24] Jackson's first appearance was in React with Onyx, for their 1998 album Shut 'Em Down. He credited Jam Master Jay for improving his ability to write hooks, [16] and Jay produced Jackson's first unreleased album. In 1999, that Jackson left Jam Master Jay, platinum producer Trackmasters signed him to Columbia Records. They sent him to a studio in Up state of New York, where he produced thirty-six songs in two weeks; [11] eighteen were included on his 2000, 2000 album, of the Dollar. Jackson's popularity began to grow after the controversial hit underground single How to Rob, which he wrote on a half-hour drive in a studio. [21] The track comically describes how he would rob famous artists. Jackson explained the logic of the song: There are a hundred artists on that group and make yourself relevant. [21] Rappers Jay-Z, Kurupt, Sticky Fingaz, Big Pun, DMX, Wyclef Jean and wu-tang clan responded to the track,[29] and Nas invited Jackson to join him on his Nastradamus tour. [30] Although How to Rob was to be released with Thug Love (with Destiny's Child), two days before he was scheduled to shoot the music video Thug Love, Jackson was filmed and hospitalized. On May 24, 2000, Jackson was attacked by a gunman outside his grandmother's former home in southern Jamaica. After getting into a friend's car, he was asked to come home to get some jewelry; his son was in the front vard. [guote required] Jackson returned to the back seat of the car, and another car pulled up nearby; an assailant approached and fired nine shots at close range with a 9mm pistol. Jackson was shot in the hand, arm, hip, both legs, chest and left cheek. [12] [18] His facial wound resulted in a swollen tongue, the loss of a wisdom tooth, and a slightly stabbed voice; [18] [30] His friend was wounded in the hand. They were taken to a hospital, where Jackson spent thirteen days. The alleged attacker, Darryl Baum, a close friend and bodyguard of Mike Tyson, [34] was killed three weeks later. Jackson recalled the shoot .... I was scared the whole time... I was looking into the rearview mirror like, 'Oh shit, someone shot me in the face! Burn, bur In his autobiography, From Pieces to Weight: Once Upon a Time in Southside Queens, he wrote: After I was shot nine times at close range and did not die, I began to think that I had to have a purpose in life ... How much more damage could that bullet have done? Give me an inch in this direction or that, and I'm gone. Jackson used a walker for six weeks and fully recovered after five months. When he left the hospital he stayed in Poconos with his girlfriend and son, and his training regimen helped him develop a muscular physique. [12] [18] Jackson signed a release contract with Columbia Records in hospital before being dropped from the label and on the record industry blacklist due to his song Ghetto Qu'ran. Unable to work in a studio went to Canada. [37] With business partner Sha Money XL, Jackson recorded over thirty songs for mixtapes to build a reputation. In an interview with HitQuarters, Marc Labelle of Shady Records A& R said Jackson used the mixtape to his advantage: He took all the hottest beats from each artist and flipped them with better hooks. Then they came to all the markets on the mixtape Guess Who's
Back?. He then released 50 Cent Is the Future supported by G-Unit, a mixtape that revisits material by Jay-Z and Raphael Saadig. [26] 2002–2007: Mainstream breakthrough, Get Rich or Die Tryin', and The Massacre 50 Cent in 2006 In 2002, Eminem heard Jackson's Guess Who's Back? CD, received by Jackson's attorney (who was working with Eminem's manager, Paul Rosenberg). Impressed, Eminem invited Jackson to fly to Los Angeles and introduced him to Dr. Dre. [12] After signing a \$1 million record deal, [24] Jackson released No Mercy, No Fear. The mixtape contained a new track, Wanksta, which appeared on the soundtrack to Eminem's 8 Mile. Jackson also signed with Chris Lighty's Violator Management and Sha Money XL's Money uote required] Jackson released his debut album, Get Rich or Die Tryin' (described by AllMusic as arguably the most publicized debut album by a rap artist in about a decade), in February 2003. Rolling Stone noted its grooves of dark synths, vibrant keyboards, and a persistently funky bounce, with Jackson completing production in an undeterable, laid-back stream. It debuted at number one on the Billboard 200, selling 872,000 copies in its first four days. The lead single, In da Club (noted by The Source for its fiery horns, funky organs, guitar riffs, and scattered applause of hands),[43] established a Billboard record as the most listened to song in radio history within a week. Olivia, Lloyd Banks, Young Buck and 50 Cent (left to right) in Bangkok, In February 2006 Interscope gave Jackson his own label, G-Unit, and The Game was later signed into a joint venture with Dr. Dre's Aftermath Entertainment. In March 2005, Jackson's second commercial album, The Massacre, sold 1.14 million copies in its first four days (the highest in a shortened sales cycle, [42] and was number one on the Billboard 200 for six weeks. He was the first solo artist with three top-five singles on Billboard in the same week with Candy Shop, Disco Inferno and How We Do. According to Rolling Stone, the secret weapon of the 1950s is his singing voice - the deceptively amateur tenor croon he distributes on almost any return. After the departure of The Game Jackson signed with Olivia and rap veterans Mobb Deep for G-Unit Records, with Spider Loc, M.O.P., 40 Glocc and Young Hot Rod later having joined the label, which eventually the label. [49] Jackson has expressed interest in working with rappers other than G-Unit, such as BME's Lil' Scrappy, Def Jam's LL Cool J, Mase of Bad Boy and Freeway of Roc-A-Fella, and recorded with several. [51] 2007–2010: 2007–2010: The sales battle with Kanye West, and Before I Self Destruct In September 2007, Jackson released his third album, Curtis, which was inspired by his life before Get Rich or Die Tryin'. It debuted at number two on the Billboard 200, selling 691,000 copies during its first week. [53] It was sold behind Kanye West's Graduation, released the same day; the outcome of this highly publicized sales battle between Jackson and West has been credited with the commercial decline of gangsta rap and bling style was that it previously dominated mainstream hip-hop. On the September 10, 2008 episode of Total Request Live, Jackson said that his fourth studio album, Before I Self Destruct, would be made and released in November. He released Ok, You're Right, produced by Dr. Dre for Before I Self Destruct, on May 18, 2009 and was scheduled to appear on an autumn 2009 episode of VH1's Behind the Music. On September 3, 2009, Jackson released a video [55] for soundkillers phoenix' track Flight 187, introducing his mixtape and book (The 50th Law). The song, with lyrics sparking speculation about the tension between Jackson and Jay-Z, was a bonus track on the iTunes version of Before I Self Destruct. Before I Self Destruct. Before I Self Destruct. 2010 In an interview with Contactmusic.com, Jackson said he was working on a Eurodance album, Black Magic, inspired by European nightclubs: First they played hip-hop that suddenly turned into uptempo songs, known as Eurodance. He later said he changed his next album to The Return of the Heartless Monster after writing different material when he returned home from the Invitation Tour in 2010, shelving Black Magic. [59] On September 3, Jackson supported Eminem and Dr. Dre amid rumors of tension between Jackson and Dre. [61] He recorded 20 songs according to a completely different album concept before putting them aside,[63] wanting his new album to have the aggression of Get Rich or Die Tryin'. [64] Jackson tweeted that the album was made at 80% and fans could expect it in the summer of 2011. It was eventually delayed by a year due to disagreements with Interscope Records. with Jackson saving he would release it in November 2011 under a different title from Black Magic. Eminem would appear on the album, and Jackson said he was working with new produced a song for the next album. Jackson released a song Outlaw, from his fifth internet album on June 16, 2011. The single, produced by it was released on iTunes on July 19 [70] (although Jackson tweeted that it was not the album's first single). The rapper planned to write a semi-autobiographical novel for young adults about different from his earlier books that focused on his life and the rules of power. According to the book's publisher, the first-person novel (about a 13-year-old school yard bully who finds redemption while dealing with what he did)[72] was scheduled for publication in January 2012. In a series of tweets, Jackson said that the delay of his fifth album was due to disagreements with Interscope Records,[66] later suggesting that it would be released in November 2011 with his headphone line (SMS of 50). He speculated on MTV News about not renewing his five-album contract with Interscope: I don't know ... Everything will be clear in the negotiations that will follow me with the release of this real album. And, of course, the performance and the way they actually treat work will determine whether you still want to stay in that position or not. On June 20, 2011, Jackson told Shade45: I did four songs in Detroit with Eminem. I did two with Just Blaze, a Local Boi-1da, and I did something with Alex at Kid's. We've made two that are defined singles and the other two are the kind of records that we've made, more aimed at my main audience, more aggressive, more than a different kind of energy to it. In September 2011 he released Street King Energy Track #7 to promote Street King, his energy drink based on the charity. The announcement that Jackson was shooting a music video for Girls Go Wild, the fifth lead single with Jeremih, was made on September 28, 2011. [79] Jackson's fifth album, Street King, his energy drink based on the charity. scheduled for a summer 2012 release and postponed until November 13. [81] Disagreements with Interscope Records over its release and promotional single, New Day with Dr. Dre and Alicia Keys, was released on July 27. The song was produced by Dr. Dre, mixed by Eminem and written by 50 Cent. Alicia Keys, Royce from 5'9 and Dr. Dre. A solo version of Keys was leaked by her husband. Swizz Beatz, My Life , the second promotional single from the album (with Adam Levine, lead singer of Eminem and Maroon 5), was released on November 26, 2012. In January 2014, Jackson said he planned to release Animal Ambition in the first quarter of the year, followed by Street King Immortal. [83] On February 20, he left Shady Records, Aftermath Entertainment and Interscope another album, he was released from his contract due to his friendship with Eminem and Dr. Dre: They are a special case and situation. It is also cause of the lever to have strong relations with Eminem and Dr. Dre. They would want to [jeopardize] on that little bit of money. That day, he announced that Animal Ambition would be released on June 3 and released his first track. The song, Funeral, was released with a video on Forbes.com. Produced by Jake One, it is a continuation of 50 Bars from a previous album; two more tracks were scheduled for release on March 18. At South by Southwest in Austin, Texas, Jackson performed Hold On from his new album. That song and Don't Worry 'Bout It were released with accompanying videos on March 18. According to Jackson, prosperity would be a theme of the album: This project, I had to look for a concept, a really good concept, in my perspective, and this was prosperity. I outlined all the things that would be part of prosperity, positive and negative [for animal ambition]. [91] 2015-present: Street King Immortal, failure and departure from Interscope 50 Cent in 2017 On May 14, 2015. Jackson released in June, Jackson released Get Low on May 20. 2015, as the first single from his sixth studio album, Street King Immortal (2015). The song, produced by Remo the Hitmaker, features vocals by fellow American singer Jeremih. He announced the bankruptcy on July 13, 2015. On March 31, 2017, Interscope Records released 50 Cent's last album for the label, a greatest hits album called Best Of. On June 25, 2019, The New York Times Magazine listed 50 Cent among hundreds of artists whose material was destroyed in the 2008 Universal fire. In 2020, Jackson led executive producer duties for rapper Pop Smoke's debut album Shoot for the Moon, being one of Pop Smoke's greatest inspirations. The album was released on July 3, 2020. Jackson curating the album, wishing to finish it after Pop's death. He contacted many of the album's tracks, The Woo, which became a top ten single. [96] Awards Main article: List of awards and nominations received by 50 Cent Artistry Jackson cites Boogie Down Productions, Big Daddy Kane, The Juice Crew, EPMD and KRS-One as his rapping influences, while citing LL Cool J as the inspiration behind his writing of 21 Questions. [98] Jackson also claims to have drawn influences from Nas, Rakim and The Notorious B.I.G. while working on Animal Ambition. [100] Jackson's
business ventures have had a very successful business career. It is invested financially in a highly diversified variety of industries. Jackson is now involved in the management of artists and talents, record, television and film production, footwear, fragrances, spirits, video games, mobile apps, book publishing, headphones and health drinks and dietary supplements. [101] [102] Its broad portfolio of business and investments in financial markets, mining, boxing promotion, vodka, fragrances, consumer electronics and fashion. In 2003 he founded his own record label G-Unit Records after its mainstream success. In November 2003, he signed a five-year contract with Reebok to distribute a G-Unit Sneakers line for his G-Unit Clothing Company. [105] In an interview, Jackson said that his activities used to do well while seeing all of his past and present initiatives as revolving around his alter ego. [107] Jackson also started an editorial book label, G-Unit Books on January 4, 2007 at the Time Warner Building in New York City. He wrote a number of books including a memoir, From Pieces To Weight in 2005, where he sold 73,000 hardcover copies and 14,000 hardcover copies; a political novel and a book with Robert Greene called The 50th Law, a series of 48 laws of power. In November 2011, Jackson published 50 Cent's Playground, a young adult fiction novel about a violent bully boy and his gay mother. One of Jackson's first commercial initiatives was a partnership with Glacéau to create an improved water drink called Formula 50. In October 2004, Jackson became a beverage investor when he was a fan of the drink. Health-conscious Jackson noted that he first learned about the product while at a gym in Los Angeles, and said they do a good job making the water tasteful. After becoming a minority shareholder and celebrity spokesperson. Jackson worked with the company to create a new Grape Flavored Formula 50 variant from VitaminWater and mentioned drinks in various songs and interviews. In 2007. Coca-Cola bought Glaceau for \$4.1 billion and. according to Forbes. Jackson. who was a minority shareholder, earned \$100 million from the after-tax deal. Although he no longer has a stake in the company, Jackson continues to serve as a spokesperson for VitaminWater, supporting the product, including singing it at the BET Awards, and expressing his excitement that the company continues to allow its contribution on the products. He joined the Right Guard to introduce a body spray (Pure 50 RGX) and supported Magic Stick condoms,[114] planning to donate some of their proceeds to raise HIV awareness. Jackson signed a multi-year contract with Steiner Sports to sell his memorabilia,[116] and announced plans for a dietary supplement company to coincide with his film Spectacular Regret in August 2007. [117] 50 Cent with Val Kilmer at the 2009 American Music Awards Jackson founded two film produces low-budget action thrillers for foreign film markets around the world. [110] When G-Unit Films went bankrupt, it focused on Cheetah Vision and and received \$200 million in funding in 2010. [122] In 2010, Jackson relaunched G-Unit Films and Television Inc. [124] The company has joint ventures with Will Packer's production company Will Packer Productions and Universal Television. In over 18 months, Jackson has sold projects to six different networks. Among them was Power, a STARZ drama in which he not only co-stars, but also serves as a co-creator and executive producer. Power debuted in June 2014 and was renewed for a second season after one episode. Power's August 2 season finale garnered high ratings during the season, more than doubling the first and generated 71% of the African American audience of any premium series scripted since 2006. Jackson is co-star, co-creator and executive television producer of the starz network drama where he signed a 2-year contract with representation from the Performing Arts Agency. with

the first of the second season being the highest season ever with 1.43 million people tuning in live. [126] [127] Jackson is also executive television producer for Dream School for SundanceTV, a series that follows fifteen high school dropouts while being taught by a number of celebrity teachers. In 2002, Jackson filed an application with the U.S. Patent and Trademark Office to register the term 50 Cent as a trademark for clothing, sound recordings, and live performances. The application was published in 2004. It has since applied for further trademark registrations. In July 2011, Jackson launched a philanthropic initiative to provide food to a billion hungry people in Africa by 2016, joining Pure Growth Partners to introduce Street King. A share of the proceeds from each Street King a billion people in Africa over the next five years 50 Cent and I share a common vision: addressing the world's problems through smart and sustainable business models, said Chris Clarke, founder and the hunger afflicting children around the world, we need socially responsible companies that influence real change now more than ever. Jackson said: I am inspired by Clarke's vision and innovative approaches to tackling serious problems. It's our mission with Street King to really change the lives of children around the world. [132] In 2011, he founded SMS Audio, a consumer electronics company that sells Street by 50 headphones, pledging to donate part of their sales to charity. 2015, SMS announced new co-branding agreements with Reebok and Marvel. He added those to existing partnerships with Walt Disney Parks, Lucasfilm's Star Wars and Intel. [135] In 2014, Jackson became a minority minority in Effen Vodka, a brand of vodka produced in the Netherlands, when it invested undisclosed amount in Sire Spirits LLC. [138] He currently supports the product through his live performances and social media. The rapper was asked to take part in two bottled promotional signatures, one in Oak Creek and another at Sun Prairie. Jackson made an appearance at the Liquor Warehouse in Syracuse, New York on April 25, 2015, where he sold 1.400 bottles (277 gallons) of Jackson's liquor brand, Liquor Warehouse owner George Angeloro reportedly provided 300 cases (1.800 bottles or 357 gallons) of Effen Vodka, which sells for \$30 a bottle, before the event, [140] In December 2014, Jackson signed a \$78 million deal with FRIGO Revolution Wear, a luxury underwear brand. The joint venture is partnered between Jackson, basketball player Carmelo Anthony, baseball player Derek Jeter and Mathias Ingvarsson, the former president of mattress company Tempur-Pedic. Jackson has become the chief designer for the single pair brands of fridge boxers. [142] In April 2015, Jackson brooded by investing in Jamaica, exploring foreign investment opportunities on the island when he met with some local officials and had ongoing discussions about investment opportunities in the Montego Bay tourist area. Over the years, Jackson has invested his earnings from music and celebrity sponsorships in a number of privately controlled companies, real estate, stocks, and bonds. [110] Some of its investments lost value during the 2008 recession. In December 2008, he told the Canadian press that he had been hit by the recession, losing several million dollars on the stock exchange. Unable to sell his Connecticut mansion, Jackson sent Before I Self-Destruct back due to the severity of the economic downturn. His Farmington mansion located on 50 Poplar Hill Drive that he tried to sell for years filed for bankruptcy in 2012 at \$10 million but was valued at \$8.3 million in 2015. He first tried to sell the house in 2007 for \$18.5 million, and lowered the price several times over the next five years, when he was up and off the market. In January 2011, Jackson earned \$10 million after using Twitter to promote a marketing company of TV Goods - the company responsible for marketing its headphone range. Sleek by 50 Cent. Jackson bought shares at 17 cents each. Jackson then made a recommendation on the shares on Twitter, raising his value of the four cents to nearly 50 cents (32p) each. closing Monday at 39 cents (25p). Jackson was later investigated by the Securities and Exchange for violating securities laws following his tweet that may have constituted insider trading allegations through his pump and dump stock investment strategy. [147] In 2013, Jackson became a minority investor in Hang w/, a mobile live video broadcasting app used by dozens of celebrities to broadcast their daily activities and chat with fans. The app has been downloaded more than 1 million users as of February 2015[update]. Other minority celebrity investors include former NFL player Terrell Owens and record producer Timbaland. [150] [151] In 2008, Jackson visited a platinum, palladium and iridium mine pit in South Africa and met south [154] On July 21, 2012, Jackson became a licensed boxing promoter when he formed his new company, TMT (The Money Team). Authorized to promote in Nevada (where most major fights take place in the United States). A former amateur boxer, Jackson signed gold medalist and former featherweight champion Yuriorkis Gamboa and Olympic middleweight medalist Andre Dirrell. On July 29, 2012, he and boxer Floyd Mayweather Jr., signed IBF featherweight champion Billy Dib. They unveiled plans to challenge dominance at the mixed martial arts box office and change the boxing landscape with TMT Promotions. Boxer Zab Judah also expressed interest in making a deal with Jackson. In December 2012, Mayweather and Jackson parted ways with the company, with Jackson controlling the promotions[159] with Gamboa, Dirrell, Dib, James Kirkland, Luis Olivares and Donte Strayhorn in his stable. Bankruptcy On July 13, 2015, Jackson filed for Chapter 11 bankruptcy protection in the U.S. Bankruptcy Court for the District of Connecticut with a debt of \$32,509,549.91. [160] On July 17, 2015, the Court issued an order allowing a creditor to proceed with the punitive damages phase of a trial against Jackson in a New York state courthouse, in connection with the alleged publication of a private video. His assets were listed between \$10 million and \$50 million in his bankruptcy petition, though he testified under oath that it is worth \$4.4 million. Citing between \$10 million and \$50 million in debt, and the same amount in assets. Later in the week, Jackson's bankruptcy lawyers clarified court documents that legal fees and sentences of more than \$20 million in the last year have been the main cause of the filing. Its archives list 32 entities in which it has a stake. The bankruptcy came days after a jury ordered him to pay \$5 million to rapper Rick Ross' ex-girlfriend, Lastonia Leviston, for invading them posting a sex tape of her and another man online. [166] In addition, Jackson lost a dispute over a failed trade deal to complete with his Sleek headphones, where Jackson of later stealing the design of the Sleek by 50 headphones, prompting a judge to reward his partner for more than \$17.2 million. [168] His Connecticut bankruptcy filing states that he owns seven cars worth more than \$500,000, including a 2010 Rolls Royce and a 1966 Chevrolet Coupé. Its \$108,000-a-month expenses include \$5,000 for gardening along with a monthly income of \$185,000, mainly from royalties and revenue from its external businesses and investments. The court filing says he also owes money to his stylist, barber and fitness coach. [171] Other details in the bankruptcy documents that sold the right to collect royalties of on-air games of his music. Half of the rights to his portfolio were sold to British independent music publisher Kobalt Music Group for \$3 million and the other half for another \$3 million with sales of his albums allowing Jackson to own 100% of the rights to master recordings by paying only for distribution. Zeisler, a Bridgeport law firm, represented 50 Cent in bankruptcy, which later led to Jackson filing a \$75 million lawsuit against his own attorneys. He said his lawyers did a terrible job of representing him, citing in particular the fallout from his failed Sleek Audio headphone adventure, and accused Garvey Schubert Barer, a Wall Street law firm, of not employing the knowledge and skills needed to address the circumstances of the case. I don't want him to be one of them,[38] and he's 50, Southside and Cold World on his back: They're a product of that environment. It's on my back, though, so it's all behind me, Jackson, with her, on September 1, 2012, [196] At the age of two. Sire modeled for Kidz Safe, a children's headphone brand, earning \$700,000 through his contract. In 2005, Jackson endorsed President George W. Bush after rapper Kanye West criticized Bush for a slow response to the victims of Hurricane Katrina. If his felony convictions didn't stop him from voting, he said, he would vote for the president. Jackson later said that Bush has less compassion than the average human. By all means, I don't aspire to be like George Bush. In September 2007, he told Time that even though he wouldn't support a candidate in 2008, he liked Hillary [Clinton]. Six months later, the rapper told MTV News that he changed his support for Barack Obama after hearing him talk, but that he had lost interest in politics. [204] When asked about his opinion on President Obama's May 9, 2012 endorsement of gay marriage, Jackson said: That's why ... I encouraged same-sex activities. I've engaged in fetish areas a couple of times. He had been criticized for anti-gay comments in the past. [207] Despite having numerous songs referring to drug and alcohol use, Jackson remains teetotal, citing a bad experience with alcohol as the main reason. [210] Forbes noted Jackson's wealth in 2007, ranking him second behind Jay-Z in the rap industry. He lives in a mansion in Farmington, Connecticut, formerly owned by former boxer Mike Tyson, [213] listing it for sale at \$18.5 million to get close to his son (who lives on Long Island with his ex-girlfriend). The mayor of Bridgeport, Connecticut, declared October 12, 2007, 50 Cent Curtis Jackson bay, honoring the rapper with a proclamation and a key to the city. One of Jackson's New York homes, purchased in January 2007 for \$2.4 million and at the center of a lawsuit between Jackson and Shaniqua Tompkins, caught fire on May 31, 2008 while filming in Louisiana. In December 2008, he told the Canadian press that he had lost several million dollars on the stock exchange and, unable to sell his Connecticut mansion, had postponed Before I Self-Destruct due to the economic downturn. Jackson won a lawsuit in November 2009 against Taco Bell for the fast food chain's use of his name without permission. Jackson endorsed Democratic candidate Hillary Clinton in the rump campaign to make an appearance on behalf of the candidate. However, he endorsed Donald Trump in 2020, due to his dislike of Joe Biden's tax plans. A week later, he withdrew his endorsement, saying on Twitter F--k Donald Trump, I never liked him.,[224] and endorsed Biden. On June 29, 1994, Jackson was arrested for selling four vials of cocaine to an undercover police officer. He was arrested again three weeks later when police searched his home and found heroin, ten ounces of crack cocaine and a starter gun. Although Jackson was sentenced to three or nine years in prison, he served six months in a training camp (where he earned his high school equivalence diploma). According to him, he didn't use cocaine, [13] Jackson and four members of his entourage were arrested shortly before 2 a.m.m. on December 31, 2002, when police found a .25-caliber handgun and a .45-caliber handgun in a parked car (which they searched because of its colorful windows) outside a Manhattan nightclub. The rapper has been charged with two counts of criminal possession of a weapon. Jackson was sentenced to two years probation on July 22, 2005 for a May 2004 incident, when he was charged with three counts of assault and battery after jumping into the audience when he was hit by a bottle of water. On July 21, 2007, For using his image in a promotion, he said he threatened his safety. He was alerted by a staff member to an Internet advertisement on a Myspace page. According to court documents, the ad had a cartoon image of the rapper with Shoot the Rapper and you'll win \$5000 or five guaranteed ring tones. Although the ad did not use his name, the image presumably resembled him and suggested that he approve the product. The lawsuit, calling the ad a vile, bland and despicable use of Jackson's image that he literally calls [ed] for violence against him, called for unspecified punitive damages and a permanent injunction against the use of his image without permission. [229] In 2008, Jackson sued Taco Bell for an advertising campaign in which he invited him to change his name for a day from 50 Cent to 79 Cent, 89 Cent or 99 Cent, in line with prices for some of his items, and they would donate \$10,000 to charity of his choice. The case was settled outside court. In May 2016, Jackson molested and insulted a janitor at the airport, accusing him of being under the influence. The janitor was an autistic teenager with hearing problems name Andrew Farrell. Le Le of the janitor had seen the viral video as a disrespect and wanted to sue Jackson for his action against their child. The lawsuit was originally over a million dollars, but the parents settled for a \$100,000 donation to Autism Speaks and its apology. Other civil and criminal matters One of his New York homes, purchased for \$2.4 million in January 2007 and at the center of a lawsuit between Jackson and Shaniqua Tompkins, caught fire on May 30, 2008 while filming in Louisiana. On August 5, 2013, Jackson pleaded not guilty to one count of domestic violence and four counts of vandalism in a Los Angeles County courthouse. If convicted of all charges, he faces up to five years in prison and a \$46,000 fine. Model-actress Daphne Joy accused Jackson of kicking and ransacking her bedroom during an argument at her apartment. building in Los Angeles' Toluca Lake neighborhood on June 23. It allegedly caused \$7,100 in property damage, leaving the scene before police arrived. Judge Ann Nevins ordered Jackson to return to court because of the Instagram messages she has made over the course of several months. He said Jackson wasn't completely clear about his funds and pointed to the rapper's posts showing piles of his money. In March 2016, Jackson stated that he would no longer use Instagram, electing instead of running his profile page from someone else. [240] Feuds Ja Rule Before signing with Interscope Records, Jackson engaged in a public dispute with rapper Ja Rule and his label, Murder Inc. Ja Rule said the conflict stemmed from a video from Queens, when Jackson didn't like to see him get so much love from the neighborhood. [242] At the Hit Factory in New York in March 2000, Jackson had an altercation with murder inc. partners. [241] Rapper Black Child claimed responsibility for the stabbing, saying he acted in self-defense when he thought someone had reached for a gun. An affidavit from an internal revenue service (IRS) agent suggested ties between Murder Inc. One excerpt read: The investigation uncovered a conspiracy involving McGriff and others to kill a rap artist who published songs containing lyrics about McGriff's criminal activities. The rap artist was killed in 2000, survived and later refused to cooperate with law enforcement regarding the shooting. The messages broadcast on murder inc.'s pager. [37] The end The rule feud was confirmed in May 2011. According to Ja Rule, I'm fine. We're not strengthening anymore. We're never going to cooperate. That's what it is. You don't have to be at war with someone, but it's also a bit like the United States and another country they might not get along with. We don't have to go to war, but we're not friends either. But we can coincide within a world. He's doing it, and he's not thinking about me, and I'm not thinking about him. On August 7, 2015, the feud between the two rappers rekindles when Ja Rule gave feedback to a social media follower via Twitter about a similar feud between Meek Mill and Drake. Enraged, Jackson later responded with photos and comments via Instagram, only with Drake. The feud resurfaced three years later, on January 19, 2018, when Ja Rule took to Twitter, calling 50 Cent on social media. 50 cents responded by buying and freeing up the first four rows of his concert. After the situation cooled, [253] G-Unit criticized the street credibility of The Game and announced that they would not appear on his albums. During a summer jam performance, The Game announced a boycott of the G-Unit, which he called G-Unot. After the Summer Jam performance, The Game recorded 300 Bars and Runnin', an extensive diss of G-Unit and Roc-A-Fella Records, for the mixtape You Know What It Is Vol. Jackson responded with his music video Piggy Bank, with The Game against Mr. Potato Head and parodies of other rivals. Spider Loc insulted The Game in the songs, and The Game released 240 Bars (Spider Joke) and 100 Bars (The Funeral) attacking G-Unit and Loc's Response. Jackson was Not Rich, Still Lyin', mocking The Game on a freestyle-booth segment of Rap City, followed by a Game diss (SoundScan) song that ridicules banks' 13-position drop in The Rotten Apple album on the Billboard 200 chart and its disappointing second-week sales. Banks responded on his Mo' Money In The Bank Pt. 5: Gang Green Season Continues with Showtime (The Game's Over) mixtape, said Jackson wrote half of The Documentary and ridiculed the game's suicidal thoughts. Rick Ross Although Rick Ross started a feud with Jackson over an alleged incident at the 2008 BET Hip Hop Awards, Jackson told news sources that he didn't remember seeing Ross there. Later that month Ross' Mafia Music was leaked onto the Internet, with lyrics seemingly disparaging by Jackson. Several days later, Jackson released Officer Ricky (Go Head, Try Me) in response to Mafia Music. The next day, Ross appeared on Shade 45 (Eminem's Sirius channel) and told Jackson to find something better in 24 hours. Before leaving for Venezuela, Jackson uploaded a video (Warning Shot) and the first in a series of Officer Ricky cartoons. In early February, she uploaded a video to YouTube in which she interviewed Tia, the mother of one of Ross' children; According to her, Ross is actually a correctional officer.
